Fundraising—Children's Doll Houses

Lynne Kennington and I called in to see Dot McDowell in Clyde a while back while we were passing and she happened to pull out the old photos. We took a copy of this, I am sure you older bandsmen will remember these times. Bob McDowell's truck with one of the first Hiab hoists in Southland unloading a playhouse at Dot & Ted McDowell's parents' house in Herbert Street which several bandsmen, along with Dot, built in Bill Lindsay's yard. All the materials were donated. The band made £2,000 (over \$4,000 in today's money) and tickets were sold for one shilling (10 cents) each. Dot thinks this was taken around the late 1960s.
